

Marylou and Jerome shared clips from many of their projects, spoke about some of the aspects of creating and distributing independent film, and fielded questions from the various schools who participated.

One of Western's main questions to the team centered around the Internet's influence on the independent filmmaker. Marylou spoke positively about sites like Youtube, basically saying that social networking and video sites help keep the independent

2010 Student EmPIXX Award Winners!

The Western Media Tech Club took home 1st place in the Independent Film Short category at this year's Student EmPIXX Awards held at Ohio University Southern Campus on April 30, 2010. Our winning film, "Jeffula: In Detention," is a comedy about a less-than-smooth vampire nerd who is placed in detention because of his antics.

The competition was very strong this year. Over twenty schools representing several states participated, submitting hundreds of entries for consideration. We knew that "Jefulla" was a neat concept, but we did not expect to do so well our first time out.

The morning media workshops featured professionals from the local NBC affiliate station WSAZ as well as sports producers from ESPN. Students were given relevant career advice as well as great tips on proper lighting and filming techniques.

Following the morning workshops, all of the participants gathered in the main hall for the awards ceremony. Close to 500 people anxiously awaited their school to be called. When the Independent film short category was announced, Southeastern High School (Richmond Dale, Ohio) had taken 2nd place for "Victor the Vampire" and Western had taken 1st place for our offering.

J. Forbes, the star of our film, accepted the award from Dr. Don Moore, Electronic Media Director of Ohio University-Southern, on behalf of our group. Needless to say, the entire Media Club shouted for joy upon hearing our name called!
